

SENATE PASSES WAAC BILL

Measure Making Corps Part of Army Goes to President

WASHINGTON, June 29—The Senate completed Congressional action today on the bill changing the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps from an auxiliary corps to the Women's Army Corps, making it a part of the Army. Since the House accepted the report from the conference committee by unanimous vote Friday, the bill now goes to the President.

The law would subject the members of the corps to the rules and regulations which apply to the men of the Army and would entitle them to the same rights, benefits, and privileges. Perhaps most important of these are the protection and benefits in case of injury or death and the provisions for dependents.

The bill also provides that officers of the corps are to have real rank rather than courtesy rank.
